

Regulatory institutions and practices inquiry

The Government asked the Productivity Commission to conduct an inquiry into improving the design and operation of regulatory regimes, given the importance of good regulation to the wellbeing of New Zealanders.

This inquiry focussed on better understanding what good regulatory institutions, practices and system management look like in the New Zealand context and on ways to improve them.

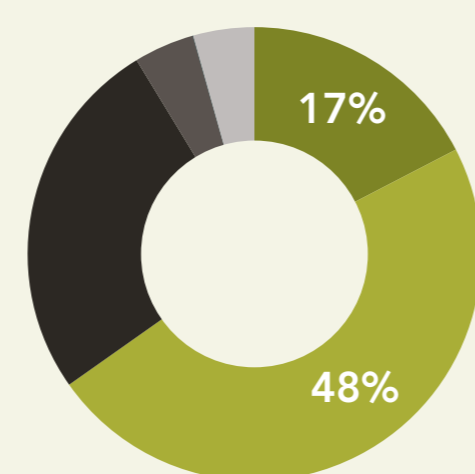


The problem

Regulation can go wrong

Common themes in 18 disaster reports from New Zealand and around the world.

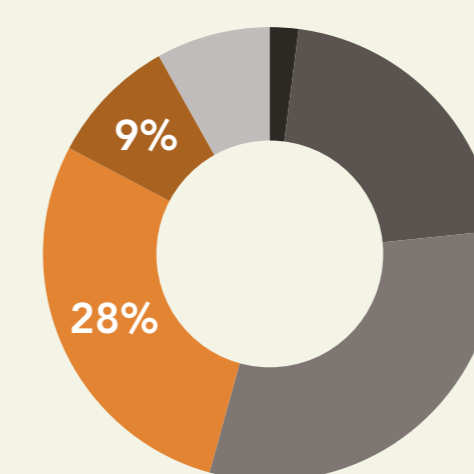
- Poor role clarity
- Weak governance, culture and leadership
- Complex regulation
- Obsolete regulation
- Inadequate resources
- Insufficient oversight
- Failures of implementation



Regulation is not keeping pace

Almost 2/3 of public sector CEOs agree that agencies "often have to work with legislation that is outdated or not fit-for-purpose"

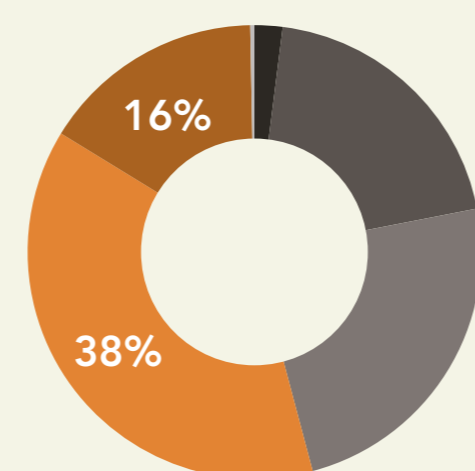
● Strongly agree, 17% ● Agree, 48%
● Neither agree nor disagree, 26% ● Disagree, 4%
● Don't know, 4%



Monitoring of regulators is ineffective

Fewer than 1/4 of regulatory chief executives agree that "formal monitoring of regulatory functions by other agencies improves the quality of regulation"

● Strongly agree, 2% ● Agree, 21%
● Neither agree nor disagree, 30% ● Disagree, 28%
● Strongly disagree, 9% ● Don't know, 8%



Regulators have weak leadership and poor culture

Fewer than 1/4 of central government regulatory workers agree that "the management systems in this organisation encourage people to challenge poor practice"

● Strongly agree, 2% ● Agree, 20%
● Neutral, 24% ● Tend to disagree, 38%
● Strongly disagree, 16% ● No response, 0.3%

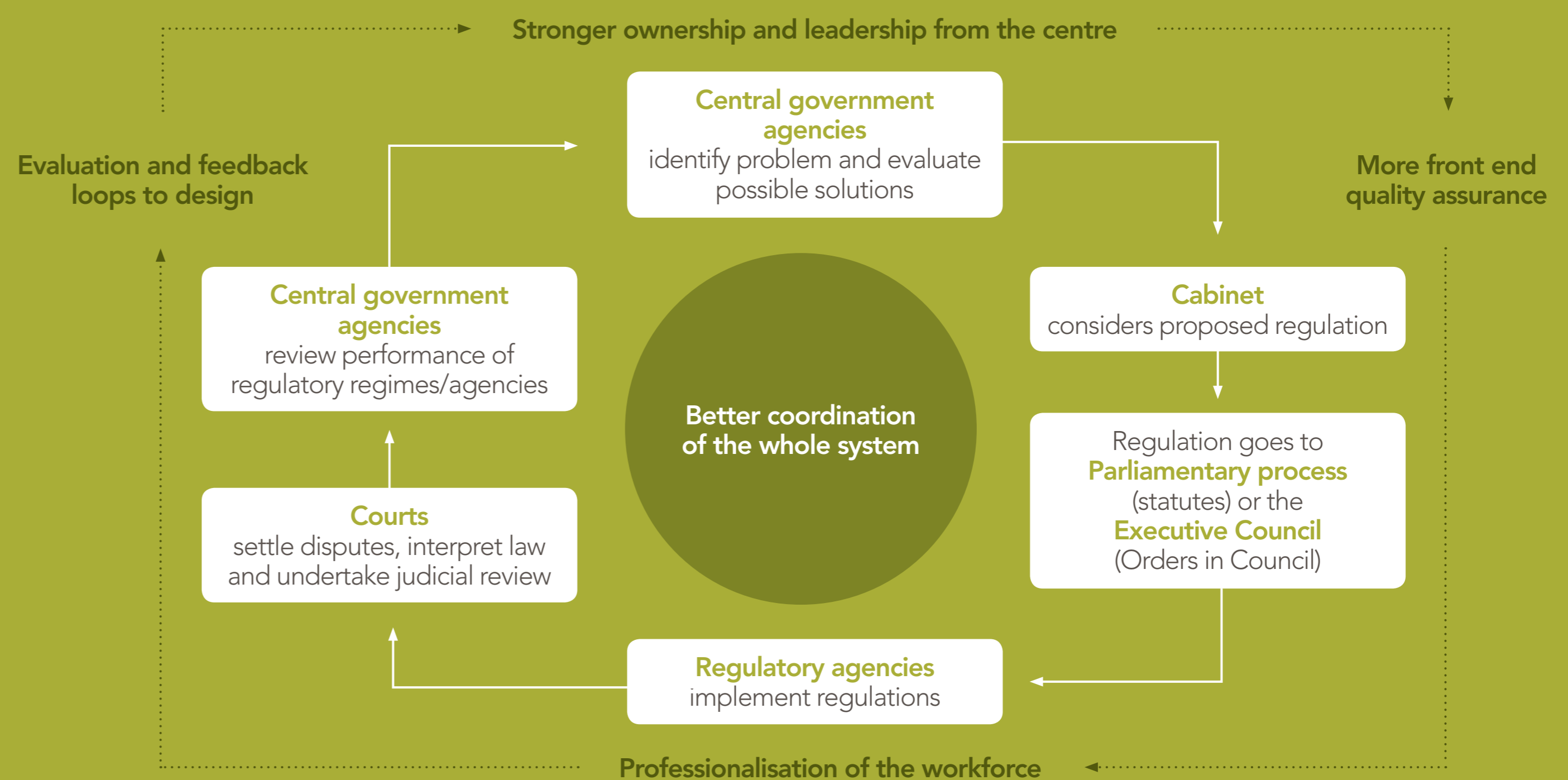

- Professionalisation of the workforce
- Evaluation and feedback loops to design
